THE SEVENTY WEEKS OF DANIEL




hristmas, like Hanukkah, should always remind us that Israel is "God's Time Clock" for the nations. When the angel Gabriel told Mary she would conceive the Messiah Yeshua, it was no coincidence! Centuries earlier God sent Gabriel to Daniel.

Daniel was told "Seventy Weeks" (Hebrew "sevens" or 490 years) was the time God had placed upon Jerusalem before the Messiah would come (Daniel 9:24-27). The 490 years measures three periods of time on God's "Time Clock." Jerusalem is the "event hand" moving prophetic history to fulfill God's Word.

When Gabriel appeared to Mary, Jerusalem was in the second period of the seventy sevens. The first period of seven sevens lasted 49 years from Nisan 445 B.C. to Nisan 396 B.C. (see Daniel 9:24; Ezra 7:11-26;

Nehemiah 2:1-6).






The "fullness of the time" corresponds to the seventy weeks of Daniel, also fulfilling Isaiah's prophecy, "Therefore the LORD Himself will give you a sign: Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a Son, and shall call His name Immanuel" (Isaiah 7:14; see also 9:6). Like Daniel, Isaiah knew the Messiah who came in "the fullness of time" would be killed and resurrected (Isaiah 53).

The "fullness of time" continues under the terms of the New Covenant that Yeshua inaugurated at His last Passover (Luke 22:14-20). It was confirmed in His death and resurrection, and then sealed by the Holy Spirit who dwells in the lives of believers.

In God's grace, the New Covenant caused the "event hand" on God's Time Clock to pause. It will resume when a world ruler confirms a peace treaty with Israel that guarantees their total control over the city of Jerusalem. The treaty will be broken. The last seven-year period ends with the return of the Messiah Yeshua to rule and reign as the Prince of Peace.

Until He returns, Hanukkah and Christmas are the reminders on God's Time Clock that we need to share the glorious news of "Glory to God in the highest, And on earth peace, good will toward men" until our Lord Yeshua returns.

n ancient Israel, names mattered. A name might be the embodiment of someone's character. A name change could indicate a kind of rebirth into a whole new purpose in life.

The practice of assigning names to people in prospect of what they would accomplish or in recognition of their character is beautifully expressed in Yeshua—"you shall call His name Yeshua, for He will save His people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). The Hebrew word Yeshua (Jesus) means, "The Lord is salvation" (a clear reference to what He would do).

Messiah's Character in Isaiah 9:6

An example of names being used prophetically to signify the character of Yeshua is found in Isaiah 9:6— "For unto us a Child is born, unto us a Son is given; and the government will be upon His shoulder. And His name will be called Wonderful, Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

This verse, which stresses the royalty of Messiah and His authority, speaks prophetically of Yeshua. We are told that "the government will be upon His

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n Hanukkah, the Feast of Dedication, Jewish people remember one of the shining moments in Israel's history. It is a glorious story of the best kind—a righteous underdog battling against seemingly insurmountable odds and prevailing. The mighty Maccabees rallied a beaten and dispirited people and turned them into winners.

Today, Hanukkah is a festival with special foods and activities for Jewish people everywhere. Jewish children play with the *dreydl*, a top with Hebrew letters that proclaim "A Great Miracle Happened There."

Families also celebrate together and eat *latkes*—potato pancakes fried in oil—or *sufganiyot*—jelly-filled deep-fried doughnuts—to commemorate the great miracle. For as the legend is told, when the Jewish people recaptured and cleansed the Temple in Jerusalem, a one-day's supply of holy lamp oil lasted the eight days necessary to procure more. For this reason, Hanukkah is celebrated for eight days. Each evening, another light of the *menorah* is added in gratitude for God's faithfulness.

United Under Persecution

The Temple was liberated by a family named the Maccabees (Maccabee means "Hammer"—a title born of their bravery and seemingly supernatural strength). The Maccabees, or Hasmoneans, were a family from the town of Modi'in that was headed by a priest named Mattathias. The courageous Maccabees embody the story of Hanukkah and the Jewish resistance to oppression that has inspired generations.

At that time, Antiochus Epiphanes, the wicked Seleucid monarch, had done all he could to stamp out the Jewish faith. When at last he ordered the Jewish people to worship him, Mattathias and his sons, Judah, Jonathan and Simon, rose up, rallied their followers and defeated him.

After Mattathias died in about 166 B.C., Judah assumed the mantle of leadership. Under his able command, the Jewish people scored victory after victory. Traditionally, Hanukkah celebrates the capture of Jerusalem and rededication of the Temple in 164 B.C. But as we follow history's tale, we shall see that it leads us directly to a world that saw the arrival of Messiah Jesus.

Victory and Its Aftermath

The Hasmoneans gradually extended the borders of Judea and gained independence. The challenge that now faced them was to make the transition from a guerrilla fighting force to leading an independent country. During centuries of exile, the dream of a Davidic king had seemingly died. Under Persian rule, the High Priesthood had become the most powerful office in Jewish life.

In 140 B.C., the Great Assembly, the ruling body of the Jewish people, made Simon Maccabee the High Priest—despite the fact that he was unqualified to hold this all-important office. For although the Hasmoneans were a well-respected priestly family, they were not descendants of Zadok (I Chronicles 24:1–3), the family line through which the high priesthood had been chosen.

The Great Assembly also vested Simon with authority as the ruler of the Jewish people and made these offices hereditary. However, the Great Assembly added this "sunset clause" to Hasmonean authority: "until a true prophet shall arise" (1 Maccabees 14:37).

Even so, the Hasmoneans were poised to consolidate their political power even as they had consolidated their military strength.

The Fall of the Hasmoneans

The ruling houses of the Ancient Near East were hotbeds of intrigue and corruption. The Hasmoneans, with whom the hopes of Israel had been so firmly placed, fought among themselves as they spiraled downward in successive generations. Simon, the last of the brave sons of Mattathias, was murdered at the instigation of his son-in-law.

Although Simon's son, John Hyrcanus, assumed power and continued to add to Israel's territory, the Greek style of the Hasmonean court became increasingly at odds with the mood of the people. John's heir, Aristobulus, further angered the populace by taking the title of King. This greatly antagonized the rising party of the Pharisees, who rightly pointed out that the Hasmoneans were not of the line of David.

Things grew even worse when Aristobulus' widow, Salome Alexandra, married Alexander Jannaeus and proclaimed him High Priest. Again, the Pharisees were offended, for the Torah explicitly forbids the High Priest from marrying a widow (Leviticus 21:14). An uprising broke out in 90 B.C., and Alexander responded with mass executions. He crucified 800 rebels, many of them Pharisees.²

The rise of the Roman Empire proved to be too much. The final

defeat of Antigonus Mattathias, the great-great grandson of that first courageous Mattathias, came in 37 B.C. The end of the house of the Hasmoneans ushered in the house of Herod and with it, the earthly ministry of Jesus the Messiah.

A True Prophet Arises

The history of the Hasmonean dynasty is an object lesson about imposing "man's way" upon God's will. There is only one figure who fulfills the job description of the "true prophet" envisioned by the Great Assembly. It is Jesus, the rightful holder of the office of High Priest, who has offered Himself as the lasting and perfect sacrifice (Hebrews 7:23-28). He alone is the true Son of David, the King of Kings Who shall reign forever (Revelation 17:14).

These lessons from Israel's ancient history should not be lost on the Israel of the 21st century—or on us. Although Israel may be tempted to trust in ambassadors or weapons to guarantee the security that only God can provide, the nation will one day know that prophecy, priesthood and royalty flow from only one source: the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob—and the Messiah whom He has sent.

Micah 5:2

Jewish and Gentile Christians have delighted in the literalness of this prediction of the birth of Yeshua. The Gospel writers clearly connect Micah 5:2 with the Messiah. Just as King David was born in relative obscurity in Bethlehem, so too will King Yeshua be born in the king's

birth town.

But as for you, Bethlehem Ephrathah, too little to be among the clans of Judah, From you One will go forth for Me to be ruler in Israel. His goings forth are from long ago, from the days of eternity.

The Encyclopedia Judaica states that Micah "looked forward, in a much broader eschatological sense, to an ideal ruler (the basis of Royal Messianism) who would be of the Davidic

dynasty, coming from David's native town of Beth-Lehem (5:1-3)" (Volume 6, p. 866). It is true that the Messiah will come to Israel someday as Conquering King, but He will first be born a babe in a manger in Bethlehem. Other prophecies will be literally fulfilled by Him in His death as a substitute for the sins of His people and in His victorious resurrection from the dead.

It is this Messiah whom the Chosen People must receive before He appears again as "the One to be Ruler in Israel." And this Messiah, though invading the realm of human history, is not bound by time. His existence and activities are from the ancient of times, from the very days of eternity. No wonder Isaiah describes this Child to be born, this Son to be given, as the Father of Eternity (Isaiah 9:6). No wonder John the Baptizer, although older than his cousin, said in understated praise, "After me comes a Man who is preferred before me, for He was before me" (John 1:15, 30).

So in this marvelous Messianic promise in Micah 5:2 we see His humble first coming, a babe in the little town of Bethlehem. But Yeshua is also seen in His glorious second coming, the Ruler in Israel, the Eternal God, and the One who will "stand and feed His flock . . . this One shall be our peace" (Micah 5:4-5). As we celebrate the Lord's Bethlehem birth this year, may we maintain our focus upon His unique majesty as Messiah of Israel, Savior of the world.

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shoulder," thus fulfilling God's promise to David that "your throne shall be established forever" (2 Samuel 7:16).

Messiah's Deity Emphasized in Isaiah 9:6

The verse lists a number of names by which He will be called, each prophetically indicative of His work or His character as Messiah. He is called "Wonderful Counselor" in anticipation of the wise counsel that He would give.

Next, the verse refers to the Son as the Mighty God. When Yeshua calmed the sea and stilled the storm (Mark 4:39-41), He demonstrated that he was "the LORD your God, Who divided the sea whose waves roared" (Isaiah 51:15).

The New Covenant testifies that Yeshua was, as Isaiah prophesied, the "Eternal Father." He was in the beginning with God (John 1:1), and was one with the Father (John 10:30). He was "before Abraham" and was the eternal I AM who gave birth to and has preserved His people Israel (John 8:58).

Finally, Yeshua was the Prince of Peace anticipated in Isaiah 9:6. In His final discourse to His disciples, Yeshua said, "Peace I leave with you, My peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid" (John 14:27). The New Covenant says, "He Himself is our peace" (Ephesians 2:14).

As we read through the Hebrew Scriptures, we find that the names attributed to the Messiah paint a prophetic picture of His character and works. Moreover, we see that all of these prophetic utterances were fulfilled perfectly in Yeshua, our Savior and our God.

Then the young man prayed, acknowledged his sin and asked Jesus to be his Savior. After expressing his joy, he said he wanted to continue coming to the congregation. Pray for this young man as he is discipled and grows in his faith.

CHOSEN PEOPLE MINISTRIES REPRESENTED AT FILM FESTIVAL

One of Chosen People Ministries' staff members recently had the opportunity to be a witness for the Lord as a panelist at a film festival where Joined Together? was being shown.
