Every year at this time, our founder, Rabbi Leopold Cohn, and later his son, Joseph Hoffman Cohn, reminded the friends of Chosen People Ministries that we have a Biblical mandate to preach the Gospel "...to the Jew first—and also to the Gentile" (Romans 1:16).

These inspired words of the Apostle Paul have served as the clarion call of your mission to the Jewish people for 115 years! As the seventh leader of our historic mission to the Jewish people, I plan to continue this heritage and great tradition!

I hope you will pray for us and continue to support our missionaries and evangelistic projects throughout the year. We are partners in bringing the Good News to our Jewish people. This ministry is so critical, as we are now one year closer to Messiah's coming!

We simply cannot do this great work without you! Your prayers, financial support and, most importantly, your entrusting your Jewish friends to us, are of inestimable value. Thank you for sharing the joy of Jewish evangelism with us.

May I take a few moments of your time to tell you about the results of our recent evangelistic initiatives and describe our vision for the future?

Hanukkah and Christmas Ministries

Our staff presented the Gospel to hundreds of Jewish people through Hanukkah and Christmas outreaches in many major urban centers around the world. Most of the

This short-term mission experience takes place in South Florida. Messianic congregations we planted had Hanukkah outreach parties, and the results were so encouraging!

South Florida is rapidly becoming the second-largest Jewish population center in the country—and it is also the location of our newest Messianic outreach center. God moved powerfully through our evangelistic events there during the holiday season.

Ben Alpert, one of our long-time staff members, reports:

On Sunday, December 28, on the last night of Hanukkah, our South Florida ministry held a very unusual Hanukkah outreach.

Many of our communities here in South Florida are gated and very hard to reach—but the Lord opened a great door of opportunity with the social director of a nearby housing complex (himself a Jewish man who does not believe in Jesus). He invited two other communities to hear us present the story of Hanukkah to the mostly elderly Jewish people living in the complex.

We began with a catered dinner and then performed a musical presentation of the themes of the holiday—linking these themes to the coming of the Messiah Jesus, the true Light of the World! We were able to weave together the message of good triumphing over evil and the need we all have for the Redeemer! The response was wonderful





and we had many conversations with Jewish people who do not yet know the Lord—many who are only steps away from eternity!

We continue to follow up with the many people who showed an interest in the Gospel—some hearing the message in a Jewish way for the first time!

New Ways of Reaching Jewish People for Jesus

As you know, we sponsored a showing of a film in New York City that focused on Bob Dylan's "Gospel Years." This documentary was produced by a non-Messianic Jew, and I had the privilege of being interviewed extensively in the film. I was actually able to explain in detail what it means for a Jew or a Gentile to be *born again!* Of the several hundred Jewish people who packed the auditorium that night, it is likely that very few had heard the Gospel before.

We also sent a team to India to reach wandering Israelis. Israeli

This event held in New York City in November drew many Jewish seekers.

around the world after completing their army service. They often spend time in the United States—New York City and Los Angeles in particular—and also in Thailand, Brazil, Argentina, New Zealand and especially India!

One of our team members who spent three weeks sharing the Gospel with Israelis in India visited many of the sites that were recently attacked by Muslim terrorists. The Lord spared her life, as she could have easily been there at the very time that the attacks took place. Our team talked to dozens of Israeli travelers about Jesus—having deep conversations about faith in Messiah with people who were often quite open to the Gospel! It was an incredible outreach and we hope to do more of this type of ministry in the future.

Creative Evangelism Is Critical in Reaching Jewish People Today


In addition to the day-by-day, heart-to-heart, person-to-person evangelism we are continually doing through our missionaries, congregations and Messianic Centers, we also believe these **creative new approaches to Jewish evangelism are essential** if we are going to reach the wide variety of Jewish people in the world.

I am sure you know why this is true. Jewish people are often resistant to the Gospel because of the negative history between Christians and Jews. From the Crusades to the Holocaust to the vicious pogroms in Russia, Jewish people have historically felt victimized by Christianity. In light of this terrible history, we have much to overcome in our witness to Jewish people today. Somehow, we must show Jewish people that real Christians love God's chosen people.

Dear friend, this is what takes so much creativity as the first response of most Jewish people to the Gospel is to resist the message or even to be

Brooklyn

Klaudia, our missionary in Brooklyn, New York, tells of the Bosky* family whom she has known for many years. On one occasion Ari accompanied his believing aunt Rivka to our Messianic retreat. Seven years later, his mother Nadia came to Klaudia asking for prayer for Ari, as he had become involved with drugs. God was very merciful and delivered him from his addiction. Later, Ari married an Orthodox Jewish woman. This past June, Klaudia was invited to a Bosky family picnic, where a discussion about Yeshua (Jesus) started very naturally. During the discussion, she learned that Ari's wife was planning to divorce him. Ari was upset and having difficulty with the Orthodoxy of his wife's family. Rivka and Klaudia took a walk with Ari to talk with him about Yeshua and about personally receiving Him as his savior and helper. Ari was moved to tears and prayed to receive the Lord. Today the family is restored, with Ari and his wife looking forward to the birth of their first child. What a blessing to see how a seed planted at our Messianic retreat blossomed years later to bear fruit in Ari's life!

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Victor and Julia B. left behind family, friends and successful academic careers in Estonia to move to Israel, part of a larger movement of almost a million Russian Jews in the last decade (Amos 9:13-15). In Soviet-occupied Estonia, where Victor had taught scientific atheism at the university, they had been cut off from their Jewish roots. Nevertheless, they were earnestly seeking the truth.

The first believer they ever met had a completely unexpected love for the Jewish people and shared the message of salvation with deep compassion. This divinely orchestrated meeting completely changed Victor and Julia's lives, as God changed their "hearts of stone" to "hearts of flesh" on their way to Jerusalem (Ezek. 36:26-27).

For seventeen years, Victor and Julia have preached the message of

salvation to their own Jewish people in Jerusalem. In Israel, they raised three children, graduated from Bible school, and helped plant three Messianic congregations, one of which Victor pastored for fourteen years. This congregation has seen more than a hundred Jewish people receive Yeshua and has trained several ministers of the Gospel.

Victor has served as Chairman of the Board of the only Messianic Bible College in Israel. Julia has written books based on Biblical texts with insights that have touched many hearts; these books have been translated and published in several countries.

I (Jack*) was born and raised Jewish in New York. When I was 10, my uncle became a follower of Jesus—my grandparents removed my uncle's photograph and we were forbidden to mention his name.

Many years later, my wife said to me, "We are going to have spirituality in our house." She dragged me to an Easter service at Scottsdale Bible Church; we arrived late and the only seats available were in the front! I slouched like a spoiled child. However, the pastor spoke to my heart as he talked about the Jewish roots of Christianity. I left feeling encouraged, but extremely confused.

We attended Scottsdale Bible Church for several weeks, and then we met Cathy Wilson, who is on staff with Chosen People Ministries, and her husband. We started attending their Messianic services. A JEWISH VIEW OF JOHN 3

While Jesus was in Jerusalem observing the Passover, many began to follow Him, seeing the miraculous signs he performed (John 2:23). The crowds following Jesus and His purification of the Temple courtyard caused quite a commotion and piqued the curiosity of Nicodemus, a leader of the Pharisees and a member of the ruling council known as the Sanhedrin (3:1). Nicodemus approached Jesus seeking answers, because he believed the miracles signified that Jesus was a teacher who had come from God (3:2).

Jesus responds to Nicodemus' inquiry by explaining that no individual can see the Kingdom of God unless he is *born from above*, which also means *born again* (3:3). Nicodemus obviously thought Jesus was speaking about physical rebirth, when he asked how it is possible for a man to enter into his mother's womb a second time (3:4).

While the term "born again" has become a popular cultural appellation for Jesus' followers, Judaism often uses rebirth as a metaphor to describe the change of a person's status, such as when an individual converts to Judaism. The Talmud describes a convert to Judaism as a newborn infant. Rebirth also occurs on a man's wedding day; when he takes a wife he becomes like a newborn child. Jewish tradition teaches that when Israel offered sacrifices to God on Rosh Hashanah (the Feast of Trumpets, or Jewish New Year; Lev. 23:24), God considered it as though He had created them as a new being.

Finally, Judaism frequently uses new birth to describe the world to come. Job looked forward to his renewal during the coming resurrection (Job 14:14) and the Dead Sea Scrolls speak of works of renewal during the world to come. In this world, God will remove sin from His people and permanently plant Israel in her land (Ezek. 36:25-36). God's people look forward to the coming world, because He will make a new creation.

Despite the presence of new birth imagery within Judaism, Nicodemus did not comprehend the significance of Jesus' declaration that a person must be *born again* to see the Kingdom of God. He did not yet recognize his own personal need for rebirth (John 3:9-10). Jewish teaching in the Mishnah¹ says that all Israel will share in the world to



come. Since Nicodemus was born into the covenant by natural birth, perhaps he thought that rebirth was only necessary for Gentiles converting to Judaism.

Yet Jesus' concept of new birth was dramatically different from the images of rebirth common within Judaism at the time. New birth is only possible *from above*, because it occurs when God transforms an individual and gives him a new heart (John 3:3; Ezek. 36:26; Jer. 31:33). This is not the rebirth of a Gentile becoming Jewish, but the spiritual awakening of God's children (John 3:6-8).

Jesus says that a person cannot enter the Kingdom of God unless he is born of both water and the Spirit (3:5). When God purifies Israel, He will sprinkle clean water on her and remove her sin (Ezek. 36:25). This cleansing occurs as a supernatural work of God's Spirit when He indwells an individual and gives him a new heart. Jesus invited Nicodemus to experience the authentic transformation that God promised to Israel—a transformed life born of the Spirit.

Scott and his wife, Dana, are beginning a dynamic Messianic congregation in West Los Angeles, California, fulfilling a vision planted in their hearts by the Lord over seven years ago.

THE KING'S MIRACULOUS POWER AND AUTHORITY MATTHEW 8-9

After the Sermon on the Mount, Jesus' followers accompanied their Master down the mountainside toward the lake. Perhaps they were wondering: if this man was indeed the King of Israel, where was His power?

To remove the doubt of His disciples, the King performed a series of miracles that certify and substantiate His Messianic kingly authority. A miracle, in Biblical days, may be defined as a suspension or alteration of natural law, such as the drying up of the Red Sea in the Exodus account (Ex. 14).

I. Authority Over Disease (Mt. 8:1-22)

Jesus the Messiah has authority over disease, and by healing the sick He demonstrated His kingly authority while on earth in fulfillment of Isaiah 53:4 (Mt. 8:17). James indicated that believers have a right to seek the will of God through godly church elders for healing (Jas. 5:14).

When the Messiah died at Calvary, He suffered for the sinful diseases of the soul. In spite of illness and disease in this present life, God's people may look forward to the "redemption of our bodies" and triumph over death (Rom. 8:22, 23).

II. Jurisdiction Over Nature (Mt. 8:23-27)

While in a boat with His disciples on the Sea of Galilee, a violent storm threatened to sink it. Awakened from sleep, Messiah quickly stilled the waters.

Messiah is the God-man. As God He is both the Creator (Col. 1:16) and Sustainer of the universe (Heb. 1:3). He alone was able to calm both the sea and the souls of His disciples (Mt. 8:26). His disciples marveled, saying, "Who can this be, that even the winds and the sea obey Him?" (Mt. 8:27)

III. Dominion Over Demons (Mt. 8:28-32)

On the eastern side of the Sea of Galilee, we see two "exceedingly fierce" Gergesene men who are controlled by demons (Mt. 8:28). The demons recognized Jesus at once and confessed what so many deny: namely, the existence of God, the divinity of Jesus, and the reality of a future judgment. The Messiah demonstrated His dominion in expelling the demons and restoring the men to their right minds.

IV. Forgiveness of Sins (Mt. 9:2-8)

In the healing of the paralytic, Jesus first dealt with forgiveness of his sins, saying that "the Son of Man has power on earth to forgive sins" (Mt. 9:6a). Only the Messiah has this power and authority. John stated that God "the Father . . . has committed all judgment to the Son, that all should honor the Son just as they honor the Father" (Jn. 5:22, 23). How you and I respond to Jesus now will determine how He will respond to us on the Day of Judgment!

V. Hope for the Hopeless (Mt. 9:20-22)

A woman with a disease of the blood approached Jesus. This woman had been to many doctors, but none could help (Mk. 5:26). Her hopes were shattered, and she despaired. Only God knew her thoughts as she reasoned, "If only I may touch His garment, I shall be made well" (Mt. 9:21). Jesus indeed is the Messiah, who has the power to heal (Mt. 14:35, 36).

By faith in our Messiah Jesus, we may reach out to Him, for He is the only hope for the hopeless soul. We give praise to God for providing this marvelous hope!

Deep Conversations in Queens

Randall and Luda Ford, based in Queens, have been enjoying fascinating discussions with Jewish



friends and neighbors. The courses in theology and apologetics that the Fords are taking at the Charles L. Feinberg Center for Messianic Jewish Studies have helped fuel several conversations. One brilliant Israeli friend started a discussion with Luda at a Bible study. The conversation continued during a fellowship meal,

and the Fords stayed up late listening to this woman's story and making a case for a personal relationship with God, not mere religion. She disagreed with them, yet repeated several times: "You don't know how much this discussion means to me. I LOVE talking about these things." Luda is excited that five Jewish ladies also told her that they want to study the Bible privately.

Jesus from a Jewish Perspective

Cathy Wilson has a wonderful ministry among seniors at a retirement center in Arizona. She recently spoke about the end times, explaining that the Jewish Messiah, Jesus, is the only way to

heaven. Afterwards, Eva* told Cathy, "I've never read the New Testament. I've never heard teaching about Jesus from a Jewish perspective!" Eva expressed interest in studying the New Testament and the Book of Revelation, and she has even been inviting her Jewish friends to the study. Pray that the Lord would reveal His



truth to Eva as she reads the words of the New Testament, and pray that hearts would continue to be touched by Cathy's ministry.

Holiday Outreach through Messianic Music

The Hanukkah and Christmas season is a time of the year when people are often more open to the Gospel. From December 19-21, Chosen People Ministries held four holiday outreach concerts featuring Marty Goetz in the New York area home to over 2 million Jewish people! Marty is a Jewish believer in Jesus and a world-renowned musician who uses his musical aifts and talents to share the Good News. We sent over 60,000 postcard invitations to Jewish homes in New Jersey and Manhattan. Many Jewish people attended the concerts, where Marty performed his beautiful music and shared his personal testimony. Chosen People Ministries staff members are currently following up on a person-to-person basis with the Jewish people who attended the events.

Helping the Homeless in Israel – Physically and Spiritually

Neriyah and Anna A. are being blessed with many opportunities to share the love and healing power of Messiah at the rehabilitation center that



is part of their ministry in Tel Aviv. As winter sets in, many homeless alcoholics and drug addicts find their way to the rehab center, which is the only one in Tel Aviv. At the center, they not only receive help for their physical addictions, but also for their spiritual needs. Neriyah and Anna are kept very busy ministering the message of the Gospel. Neriyah writes, "We believe that the only cure for their addiction is the Gospel. Please continue to pray for the salvation of souls."
